Saint Leo the Great

Sermon 6 on the Nativity

Share in the Divine Nature

Dearly beloved, today our Savior is born. Let us rejoice. Sadness should have no place on the birthday of life. The fear of death has been swallowed up; life brings us joy with the promise of eternity. No one is shut out from this joy; all share the same reason for rejoicing. Our Lord, victor over sin and death, finding no man free from sin, came to free us all. Let the saint rejoice as he sees the palm of victory at hand. Let the sinner be glad as he receives the offer of forgiveness. Let the gentile take courage as he is summoned to life. For the Son of God in the fullness of time has united himself to a human nature in order to reconcile it to its maker. You then, dearly beloved, should recognize your dignity. Since you have been made partakers of the divine nature, do not return by evil deeds to the former base condition. Bear in mind of what head and of what body you are a member. Never forget that you have been rescued from the power of darkness and brought into the light of the kingdom of God.
