Know Yourself

If we think carefully, sisters, the soul of the righteous person is nothing else but a paradise where the Lord says he finds his delight. So what do you think that abode will be like where a King so powerful, so wise, so pure, so full of all good things takes his delight? I can find nothing with which to compare the great beauty of a soul and its great capacity. Self-knowledge is so important that, even if you were raised right up to the heavens, I should like you never to relax your cultivation of it. As long as we are on this earth nothing matters more to us than humility. And so I repeat that it is a very good thing — excellent, indeed — to begin by entering the room where humility is dealt with rather than by flying off to the other rooms. For that is the way to make progress, and if we have this safe, firm foundation, who knows but that God will raise up upon it many mansions?
